LIBRARIES LAUNCH THE CLAREMONT COLLEGES DIGITAL LIBRARY

Carefully archived away at the Libraries of The Claremont Colleges are countless items documenting people, research, and events significant in the history of the Claremont Colleges. Using the Claremont Colleges Digital Library (CCDL), patrons have access to these materials that have been digitized. Students can browse or perform a keyword search. Results displayed include a thumbnail image for quick reference. Using the My Favorites feature, any media file, including audio and video, can be added to a personal folder for later viewing, or imported into Power Point for a classroom presentation.

The CCDL now has seven collections that total more than 5,000 items, covering topics on history, science, art, music, government and political science. Soon topics will include religion and the social sciences.
